The Great Disconnect

For over 100 years, Iowa's independent telephone companies have provided the necessary infrastructure to keep our state connected. But currently, regulatory policies are in the works that could jeopardize Iowa's access to equitable and fairly priced communication services, as early as 2020. You might know of one of these policies as the National Broadband Plan. We call these issues, "The Great Disconnect."

Simply put, The Great Disconnect refers to the lack of understanding and potential double standard regarding communication services in America and the flawed logic behind it that doesn't make economic sense. Despite claims on proposed policies to improve telecommunication service, they set a double standard for service - permitting broadband speeds in rural areas up to 25 times slower than more populated markets — it tears apart the existing network with counterproductive provisions that could put rural Iowa at risk of having no service at all.

Proponents of the National Broadband Plan (NBP) want you to think it will be good for rural Iowa and that ongoing investment or support is no longer required. In other words, they feel the job is done in many parts of rural Iowa. But while the fact remains that over 140 privately-owned telecommunication companies have lead the nation in broadband deployment and building robust telecommunication infrastructure — our very existence is at stake now. The mindset surrounding the NBP is that once it's built, you're done - WRONG! Telecommunications infrastructure could be compared with roads and bridges. It requires ongoing maintenance and upgrades. As Iowans require faster speeds and more bandwidth, it costs companies real money to deliver those services.

What the NBP actually proposes as its goal is to also increase broadband speed to 100 Mbps (megabits per second) for 100 million homes - unless these homes (and businesses) are in rural, less-profitable areas. Then the target is downloads of up to 4 Mbps - 25 times slower! How does this make sense for Iowans as we promote our state as a great place to live, work, and play?

Don't Get Hooked by Phishing

Jefferson Telecom wants you to be informed and aware as you go about your online activities. One potential scam to watch out for is phishing, where crooks try to get you to divulge personal information through the use of legitimate-looking emails and websites. For example, you may receive an email that looks like it's from netINS or even your bank, saying your account information or your password needs to be updated immediately for security purposes. DON'T FALL FOR IT. The scammers are trying to commit identity theft to gain access to your accounts.

Awareness of phishing tactics is the best way to avoid becoming the latest victim of these online thieves. (386-4096) Here's how to protect yourself: **1. No reply.** It sounds obvious but don't reply to unsolicited messages, especially those asking for personal information. Legitimate companies never solicit information this way.

2. Don't click links. Links in phishing messages appear to go to a legitimate website but actually redirect you elsewhere. Instead of clicking, call the company using a phone number you know is legitimate. Or type the company's Web address directly into the browser to learn how to contact the company.

3. Not by email. Don't provide personal information by email — it's not secure. When providing information through a website, make sure it's secure by checking

to see if https:// is in the Web address and a padlock icon appears on the browser's status bar.

4. Antivirus, all the time. Make sure antivirus and firewall software is always running and updated. This helps to keep viruses, worms, spyware, and keystroke loggers off your computer. SecureIT through Jefferson Telecom is a great way to help protect your computer.

If you receive a fraudulent phishing email, forward it to abuse@netins.net and do not respond to the email. After the email has been forwarded, hit the "shift" and "delete" keys to permanently delete the email from your computer. Phishers may try to lure you in, but you don't have to bite. Be careful!

At the least, this damage will shorten the life of your computer. In a worst-case scenario, it could wipe out all of your saved data or destroy your system.
